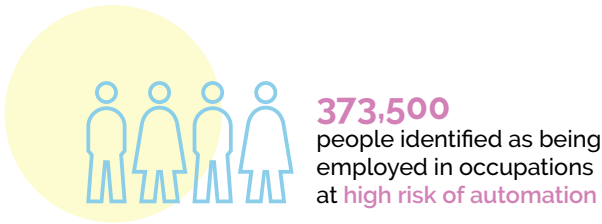


Future of Jobs in Ireland – Automation Risk

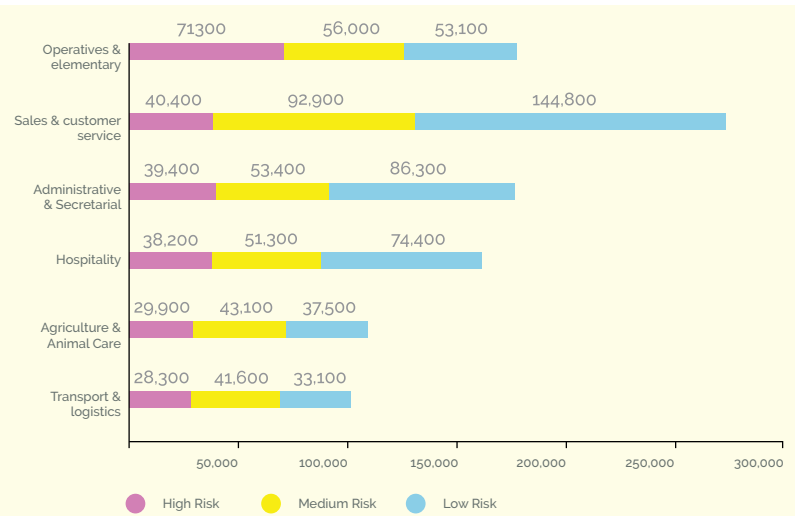


600,000 were in jobs considered at medium risk of automation



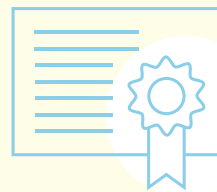
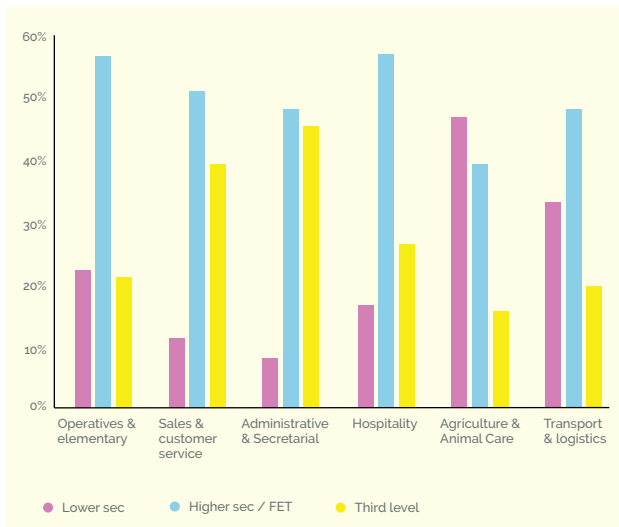
Individual occupations with highest volumes of employment at high risk of automation:

Top 6 Occupational Groups By Education Level*



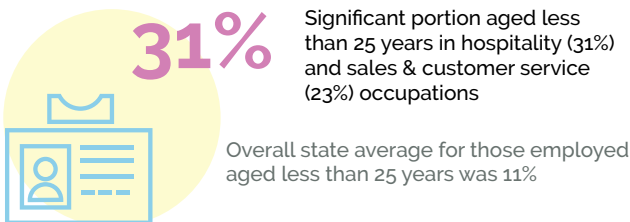

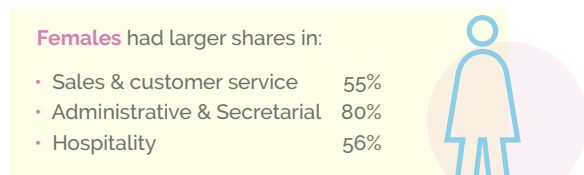
